

Jubilee of the Poor

Resources for Teachers, Catechists, or Families

BACKGROUND

The Jubilee of the Poor is an opportunity to honor the inherent dignity of all God's people and to recommit to the preferential option for the poor and vulnerable. The Church invites us to celebrate the contributions every person makes to our world.

During this Jubilee of Hope, we can look to the many saints as Christ's witnesses of hope in the world. Included in this Jubilee resource pack you will find three such saints. Each saint is a role model for us on how to be holy companions for the poor:

- Saint Martin de Porres is a role model for young children in the primary grades. He dedicated his simple life to serve like Jesus.
- Saint Louise de Marillac is a role model for children at the intermediate level. She took on the Beatitudes to care for the poor.
- Saint Óscar Romero is a role model for junior high-aged young people. He imitated Christ in living out the Works of Mercy, even at the expense of his own life.

Collectively, these saints and all the others exemplified Christ's call to love and serve God and one another. They encourage us to do likewise as holy companions to the poor and vulnerable.

The Jubilee of the Poor will be held on Sunday, November 16, 2025. You may choose to use these resources this month or throughout the year.

OVERVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

Community Blessings Activity for Primary Grades

This prayer from the USCCB invites us to reflect on the Catholic values of justice, human dignity, and solidarity, which are central to celebrating the Jubilee of the Poor. In this prayer, we acknowledge responsibility to our community, especially to those in most need. The imagery within this prayer emphasizes our need to embody Christ and see him in others. This activity encourages children in primary grades to honor the dignity of the poor and be Christ-like to them.

Take on a Beatitude Activity for Intermediate Grades

This activity begins with a crossword puzzle to help children at the intermediate grade levels recall part of the Beatitudes from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:1-12). Each clue corresponds to one of the Beatitudes, encouraging the children to reflect on the spiritual values of humility, mercy, peace, and righteousness. Once the puzzle is completed, the children are invited to take on one beatitude to help them grow in empathy for those who are poor or vulnerable.

Living Out Works of Mercy Activity for Junior High Students

This activity invites junior high children to reflect on the Corporal Works of Mercy, which are actions that help meet the physical needs of others. The list is included and serves as a reminder of Christ's call to serve those in need. Upon reflection, the children are then invited to live out one of those Works of Mercy with their family, group, or class.



Holy Companions for the Poor

Saint Martin de Porres

MARTIN DE PORRES loved God. The Holy Spirit helped Brother Martin to live as a disciple of Jesus. Brother Martin served people with a joyful heart.


Martin was born in Lima, Peru, in 1579. His father left his family when Martin was eight. This left Martin and his baby sister and their mother very poor. But Martin still gave away whatever he could to other hungry and poor people.

Brother Martin worked with poor people. He opened a home for children whose parents had died or could not care for them. He opened a hospital and schools. He also took care of animals that were sick or hungry.

In 1639, Martin died. Everyone in Lima mourned him, even bishops and members of the royal court in Lima. In 1962, the Church declared that Martin de Porres was a saint. Many statues of Saint Martin de Porres show him holding a broom, with a dog, cat, and mouse at his feet; he loved animals and




Community Blessings

Holy Companions for the Poor

Saint Louise de Marillac

French family in 1591, but all the money in the world could not stop sadness from touching her life. Her mother died when she was young, and her father died when she was a teenager. She was raised by her aunt, a nun, and Louise felt called to religious life, but she was discouraged from it. Instead, her priest arranged for Louise to marry a young man named Antoine LeGras, who could provide her with a comfortable life.

Luckily, Antoine and Louise grew deeply in love. God blessed them with a son. The couple's joy turned to sorrow after Antoine became ill. Louise cared for him until his death, just twelve years after they were married.

Some time later, Louise met Saint Vincent de Paul. He became her spiritual advisor. She spent the rest of her life helping him to care for the poor and others in need. He had many helpers, but he needed someone to train the volunteers and to organize their work. He later said that Louise was the answer to his prayers. Soon Vincent and Louise had begun the Sisters of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul. Many women joined the order, and Louise was elected the Superior.

Louise found true happiness in her work. She established hospitals, schools, and orphanages all over France. By the time Louise died in 1660, forty convents of the Sisters of Charity had been established.

Louise was canonized in 1934 and is today the patron saint of social workers. She encouraged her beloved nuns to treat the poor as if they were serving Christ himself. Like Louise, we, too, can show our love for Christ by finding practical ways to help people in need.




Take on a Beatitude

Holy Companions for the Poor Saint Óscar Romero

ÓSCAR ARNULFO ROMERO Y GALDÁMEZ

was born in Ciudad Barrios, El Salvador, in 1917. From an early age, Óscar knew he wanted to be a priest. He left home at the age of fourteen, traveling by horse to the large city where he could study.

He was ordained a priest for the Diocese of San Salvador in 1942 and quickly became a popular, well-known parish priest. In 1967, he went to work for the bishops of El Salvador and soon became Bishop of Santiago de Maria.

One day in 1975, soldiers raided a village in his diocese and killed many innocent people. Bishop Romero was horrified. At the funerals of these villagers, he spoke about people's human rights and how the military was wrong in the things they did. He wrote to the country's president.

When he became Archbishop of San Salvador, the government began to persecute the Church and killed people who protested against the leadership. Archbishop Romero excommunicated the murderers, announcing they could not receive sacraments in the Church. Violent oppression continued. Despite support from other countries, Romero became the target of the Salvadoran government's anger.

On March 24, 1980, as he began to raise the Consecrated Host, he was shot and killed by an unknown assassin while celebrating Mass in a small hospital chapel. During his homily at that last Mass, Archbishop Romero said, "Those who give their lives in service of the poor through love will live like the grain of wheat that dies. The harvest comes from the grains that die. . . . I am bound by God's command to give my life for all the people of El Salvador, even those who want to kill me."

Archbishop Romero was a fearless defender of the poor, the vulnerable, and the persecuted. In 2018, Óscar Romero was named a saint of the Church.
